
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Court of Love 15th - 16th February

Do you have a preferred Time Period?

Largely Irish, as difficult as that can be. I try to centre on 1200s in my home area in Monaghan and I can stay historically-accurate to Mac Mathúna history with early to mid-1500s English dress, but I also like to dabble in 1400s cotehardies, 8 - 900s Norse/Danish dress, and occasionally skip back to the late Bronze or early Iron Age.

Do you have any Persona background story?

1200s Fianna was a younger daughter of a Mac Mathúna sept from Dartraige on the modern Monaghan-Fermanagh border. The Anglo-Normans started to build a motte-and-bailey fortress in Cluain Eois beside the Crois Mhaol monastery to control the southern end of Loch Erne in 1212. Unfortunately it burned down in 1213 or so — around which time it was decided that Fianna should further her studies southwards in Áth Luan (where a less flammable stone castle had recently been built...).

1500s Fianna's family have skipped across the modern county of Monaghan to Farnaighe, where her father had sworn fealty and adopted English dress and customs. She has Very Strong Feelings about this abandonment of their heritage, but a good dress is a good dress...

What is your preferred SCA Activity or A&S or both?

Fencing and archery were my first loves, but I am fond of calligraphy, jewellery making, and some basic fibre arts. I like a good costume and have yet to break some student habits so finding ways to make a decent-looking outfit from budget materials is a good way to keep me occupied (do ask about the Duvet Dress!) I also have an interest in Bardic arts but can fall victim to stage fright for anything other than comedies or filk.

What keeps you coming back to the SCA?

It's my found family. It's an outlet for so many creative activities. It's an outlet for Mom Energy to be part of an event team. And it's just fun!

What has been your best SCA experience so far?

It is a bittersweet one, but our online Investiture event. It was brilliant being part of that team and seeing it finally happening in what was an incredibly difficult time for so many people (my own grandfather passed away that evening, but as a musical family the show must go on!). As far as we could tell from our bedroom in Athlone everything went flawlessly and nobody noticed any blips in our Irish translations - and I did have a bit of a Kermit flail when Her Majesty Jacquelina spoke to the new Baronial couple in Icelandic....

What is the SCA Achievement so far that means the most to you?

Being part of two new beginnings - I was the founding Seneschal of the College of Kingeslake, around which time the idea of a Barony started being kicked around. And of course, our elevation from Shire to Barony!

Seeing things grow and take root, even if Kingeslake are currently dormant, and knowing that I was some small part of that is a feeling that I can't quite put into words.

How long have you been playing?

Do you have any persona, background story?

My persona is still being worked on (yes even after 11 years), however, I've a strong feeling he likes to come up with ridiculous stories based on magical fish and linen.

What is your preferred SCA activity or A&S, or both?

I've been known to fence and partake of archery when possible. Moreso the fencing as I enjoy the speed, skill and energy displayed by opponents, while I fulfil the role of pin cushion, occasionally getting to be the needle. Of the time's I've had the pleasure to do leatherwork, I've thoroughly enjoyed this aspect of A&S and intend to make it a larger part of my coming year.

That's a hard one to pin down, recently receiving the Order of the Fox, it's quite the feeling to receive an award you certainly weren't expecting.

What title have you decided to use?

I'm stil poking that a bit, I did a bit of digging on sca.heralry.sca.org and the usual alternative for Mistress for an Irish persona is Maistreas. I definitely want it to be Irish. I had wondered if there was a reasonable case for Irish laurels to adopt Ollam or Ollamh, which used to be the name for those who had achieved the highest degree of an artistic practice or learning, but now it's me I'm thinking about it feels a bit presumptive!

I adore the title Ildánach, and have always wanted to be what it means, many skilled, like a life goal that crystalised around Princess Agnes using it in a boast for me as Lady Gytha's consort many years ago.

You chose to be surprised when it came to it, was that a positive experience?

Yes, I was always worried I would overthink things if I was forewarned if it was to ever happen, and just make myself miserable second guessing myself. It being a surprise, instead I got to move around in blissful ignorance just doing my own thing, not stressing out about anything and, of course, being conned into doing things I like to prepare for my own vigil, which impresses me no end. It means I was cheerfully breathing in fresh everygreens and playing with ogham instead of worrying. It also meant that people I love and admire went to an enormous amount of trouble and effort to make things as wonderful as possible for me and I had no idea before it happened. It was all unveiled as a complete package. I think I said somewhere that an elevation is a indescribably valuable gift to one person, I will forever treasure the blur of small and large and huge considerations put in place for me and the gorgeous things people said.

What was the piece of advice you got that you remember the most?

That being a member of the Order gives a little extra whoosh to whatever I want to enthuse about and lend weight to. That if we're enthusiastic and welcoming we are fortunate enough to have our words fall on prepared ground, as it were, and that this is also a responsibilty to use well.

What stands out for you, from the whole experience?

Selfishly - I don't think I have ever been so carried away with the idea that I matter and am thought well of by people I love, admire and am proud of being associated with. In everyday life we hear a lot about workplaces being like a family, or people being more than a number, and often it falls far short of the truth. The SCA is a place many of us feel really seen and heard, and I've loved it since the first event I went to (and was recorded for TV declaring my immediate intention of joining so I could do all the crafts). I had reasons to make things and try things, to fail and suceed in my own way and for there to be a purpose to it all that mattered to me. My elevation was like that feeling, magnified by a factor of millions. I really feel that learning and making is crucial to our development and happiness as people. What I want to put out into the world is a shared enthusiasm for learning and trying things, being excited by the experience with others who *get it*, or winning over people who didn't think they did.

The other thing is an enormous reminder of just how truly, truly wonderful my friends are, and how proud and fortunate I have been to be an apprentice (and evil step apprentice) to such amazing, talented, generous and thoroughly interesting people. (I highly recommend the apprentice experience, by the way.)

You have been elevated for doing many things (hence the title bestowed on you of Ildánach). Which craft do you most enjoy doing and teaching?

ooh that's like asking who's my favourite child! I think at the core of everything is an interest in how things work and go together, so research and joining up concepts are essential. I enjoy teaching anything that makes at least one other person light up and go "oooh, that's so cool!" and bonus points if I hear the phrase "Let's try it, for science!", so those tend to be the workshops like dyeing, pigments, glasswork and casting.

I adore anything that sources from one interest and feeds into another - like foraging and forest walking that provide the materials for pigments and inks, or ingredients for cooking. I got a bit burnt out cooking, but have noticed myself thinking of new dishes I'd like to explore at future (small) events.

Woodwork and turning has, because of equipment availability, been a more solitary thing through which I feel an intense connection with my Dad. I am finding that this year it's a bit bittersweet trying to get back into projects. It has not been the same since he passed last year, so it'll take me a little while to figure out how to make that properly comfortable again.

I need to get back to doing more illumination, I find it remarkably zen and I am horribly out of practice. I am not sure I can see me persisting with calligrapy in the same way, it seems to poke anxious demons into existence with every scroll.

Do you have any goals yet, as a new Peer?

I would love to make more arts and sciences available throughout as far a radius as I can reach. I have always regretted that Ireland has poor access to many crafts and craft materials in our modern age, despite a fantastic history of beautiful art. I *wanted* to do leatherwork and turning and blacksmithing and glass blowing and enamelling and so on and so on. I want other people who similarly wish to try things, to be supportd to find ways to do them. I want to help people figure out a way to try out any A&S activity we list on our websites. Medieval crafts teach you so much about processes and exploring the world around you, and just jumping in with vague instructions to try things til they work. I consider I've done a decent job if my class enjoys the experience of learning for learning.

I also want to try to build up the visibility of the fabulous things being achieved in the A&S community at large, bring hidden and shy beauties into the light.

Do you have any advice for anyone about to go through the same experience?

Have an ICOP - (an In case of peerage) document. It may feel weird to fill them out and you think 'ahhh, that's years away', but add your personal little wishes and they apparently make amazing things happen on the day. Make sure someone knows about it and who is storing it. Be clear on whether you want to be surprised or know in advance, to plan and ABSOLUTELY let people know if you don't want the experience. Or if you change your mind about your previous feeings about it.

If you are in a peer dependent relationship, trust them. Trust the Order you are about to join.

Be prepared for a very strange range of emotions, things you absolutely did not think you would feel. Be okay with hiding in your room alone for a bit. Watch for the small, great things and really bask in them, like someone squeezing your hand a little, the expressions of your friends' in jokes, the ceremonies and traditions you become part of. Enjoy things like someone taking great care to make your laurel cloak and brooch, your vigil book, to do your hair or bake delicious treats or run a tavern. If you're anything like me make sure at least one of your friends is prepared to either convince you to bring the decent garb, or brings it along for you. Don't worry about what you look like or if peope can see your paint splattered boots under your dress, they don't care and you certainly won't. speakers will say things that will blur from memory while fixing their message forever in your core being at exactly the same time. Bring a notebook to every event. Be awestruck and happy and feel good because while all these great people have done these great things for you, you also did this for yourself you made some astonishingly good decisions and choices to get here.

1429 – Joan of Arc and Charles d'Albret besiege and liberate the town of Saint-Pierre-le-Moûtier


1478 – George Plantagenet, Duke of Clarence died in the Tower of London, supposedly drowned in a butt of Malmsey Wine.
